THE ANNUAL REUNION:

THE NEW BOOK - That new book that we have heard much about for the past several years is in fact approaching reality.

The Chairman of the Publication Committee is glad to report the news.

For many years now, The Rice Association has required applicants for membership to furnish their record of descent from the good Deacon who came to Sudbury, Mass. in 1638. This material was received, classified and filed by the various Association Historians. Verification of the records was made as far as possible, with the available records at hand, by these historians.

So this material, organized in the same order, and as a continuation of the A. H. Ward's 'Rice Book' of 1858 and the Association's 'Supplement' of 1967, now constitutes this new book, or books.

Typists are making the Master Copy of this material in readiness for the photo-offset printing. As of this date, about 1,000 pages have been completed. There are an estimated 400 more pages of genealogical material yet to be typed.

A Past President and his good wife are working on the comprehensive index. This is perhaps the most valuable part of the book. It is expected there will be 350 to 400 pages of the index.

It would be a pity to have the book ready for printing and be required to store it away for some future date of printing because of insufficient funds. Likewise it would be foolish to print one-half the material and store the remainder until some uncertain date in the future, if ever.

It is the hope and aspiration of the Committee on Publication, as well as all those other Rice descendants who have given so much of their time, energies and substance to prepare this material for printing, that there will be some who read this News Letter that will come forth with business and financial acumen to increase our publishing fund. The need for increase in the fund is in direct proportion to the increase in the size of the book; the fund is in financial distress.

Barring any unforeseen problems, the final preparations for the book will be completed by Christmas.

## CAPT. PETER RICE HOMESTEAD

Captain Peter Rice's homestead in Marlboro, Mass. will become the new home for the Marlboro Historical Society. The large house was built in 1688 and sheltered six generations of the family. (Boston Sun.Globe 28-9-69)

Captain Peter, one of thirteen children of Thomas and Mary King and grandson of Edmund Rice, was born in Marlboro 24 Oct., 1658 and married Rebecca How about the time this house was built. They had eleven children between 1708 and 1709.

Peter Rice was captain of the trainband in Marlboro. He lived to the good old age of 95 years and died in Marlboro, November 28, 1753.



# EDMUND RICE DESCENDANTS AND QUINCY

Our ancestor, Edmund Rice, served church, his government and prospered. We dedicate our meetings to outstanding descendants who have followed in his footsteps. For this 1968 meeting, we have come to Quincy to honor one of its past citizens, William Ball Rice, 1840–1909, wholesale shoe manufacturer and philanthropist. Donor of the buildings and grounds for the first Quincy Hospital in 1889, he served as its president for his lifetime. His family and estate carried on his interest in the Hospital, community service, and established in his home, The William B. Rice Eventide Home for the Elderly, still in existence.

An 1878 Guincy history highlighted another of our family, the Reverend Luther Rice, 1820–1904, as "the most good and godly man to assume charge of the society". He served the Universalist Church now a part of the church wherein we meet today, from 1 February, 1856 till his resignation in August, 1858. Four of his sons were also Universalist preachers.

While we visit the historic Adams birthplaces, let us not forget that descendant Judge and Doctor, Thomas Rice, of Wiscasset, Maine, 1734–1812, was No. 13 of the 14 Massachusetts Presidential Electors, representing the First Eastern District, that gave their "suffrage to Mr. John Adams" in 1796 to become the second President of the United States.

#### IN MEMORIAM

#### Erwin R. McLaughlin 1893-1968

Erwin R. McLaughlin, elected our president on September 28, 1968, died December 15, 1968, at Albany, N.Y., Medical Center after a brief illness. A graduate of Baltimore Polytechnic Institute and LeHigh University, he joined the New York Telephone Company in 1913, retiring in 1955 as vice president of personnel. Funeral services were held at First United Methodist Church, Delmar, N. Y. A Memorial Service, May 24th, was held in the lovely old church in West Dover, Vt., his summer home. Mr. McLaughlin was laid to rest in the Mountain View Cemetery, West Dover, close to his ancestor, Daniel Rice, first settler in that area.

He was a descendant of Daniel Rice, the first settler. The West Dover area, Windham County, Vt. Like Deacon Edmund Rice, Mr. McLaughlin believed in serving the church, wherever he lived, as deacon, trustee and board member; and the community. A New York City settlement-house volunteer in the 1920's, he was in 1956 the first president of the Family Counselling Association, Nassau County, L. I., N. Y., and devoted several years afterwards helping it expand to the current Family Service Association.

Going overseas in one of the first World War I convoys as a private in 1917, he returned a lieutenant in 1919, after service in France as a member of the Signal Corps. A member of the American Legion, Mayflower Descendants, and past president of Upstate N. Y. Chapter, Telephone Pioneers of America, his Hobbies included genealogy, history, travel, photography and lectures, his last given December 4, 1968, in Boston at the New England Historic Genealogical Society.
