FREDERICK ROGER RICE

It is with deep sadness that we learn of the death, last January 1st, of one of our members who gave so much of his time and talents for the advancement of the Edmund Rice (1638) Association, Inc., and for the collection and the organization of that vast amount of Rice material that resulted in the publication of "A Genealogical Register of Edmund Rice Descendants, 1970."

Frederick R. Rice, the son of Leslie Ethelbert and Nellie Francis (Vose) Rice, was born in Springfield, Mass., 17 January 1895. He was a direct descendant of Constance (Hopkins) Snow and her father, Stephen Hopkins both of whom came over on the Mayflower.

He received his LLB degree from Columbia University; served World War I in the Signal Corps. He was President of Our Rice Association, 1960-1963 and a member of the Mayflower Society; #67287 and #74634.

He married Wilna Carolyn Vermillion, 29 November 1917, in Cambridge, Mass. She was a devoted and ardent helper to Fred in his "Rice" research. Together, they spent years of inestimable time in checking, proving and typing the great accumulated data on the Rice descendants. She is a descendant of Samuel Stone who left England in 1633 and became a founder of Hartford, Connecticut.

Besides his wife, he leaves a son, Frederick Roger Rice, Jr., of Arlington, Virginia, and a grandson, John Wendell Rice of California.

Fred had an extensive correspondence from which he became well known to our members and to many genealogists. To the members of the Association, for years, he was "Cousin Fred".

From his Rice records, The Edmund Rice Association has published the following:

1. "Supplement to Ward's Rice Family" 1967

"Index to Rice Names", 1970 (Names not found in Ward's Rice Family)

 "A Genealogical Register of Edmund Rice Descendants" 1600 pages, in 1970

Probably one of the most valuable contributions made by Mr. Rice was the founding of the Edmund Rice (1638) Association, Inc. News Letter. It included, among other things, aids for readers wishing to establish descent to Edmund Rice, newly discovered lines of descent, also corrections and errors were printed for the genealogical records. For ten years he was editor and publisher of the New Letter, for three years Ray Lowther

Ellis was the editor of the paper. The Newsletter is now under the editorship of Louise Rice Trudeau, Chester, Mass. The readers havehhad this uninterrupted news service over these years.

The unpublished notes and papers given to the Edmund Rice (1638) Association in 1969 are now on deposit in the New England Historical and Genealogical Society Library, Boston, where they may be used on request. Under the supervision of Miss Jeneve M. Melvin, then president of the Association, these papers were classified and methodically arranged so members of the Association have access to this valuable source of Rice genealogical records.

We extend our sympathy and prayers to his widow.

I have been told that Sarah Taintor was Abel's mother, but as Ebenezer remarried in 1791 and Abel was born 5 Sept 1792, then his mother must have been Ruth Eveleth.

According to my grandfather, Ebenezer came from Vermont to settle on the Duck River, in Maury Co., near Columbia, Tenn. Abel moved to Stokes Station, White Co., Ill., in 1825. William Emmerson was born there 17 March 1826. My grandfather William Henry was born there 31 Dec 1851.

In 1856 William Emmerson with his family and brother Allen moved to Equality, Ill., and established Saline Salt Works. They moved back to Stokes Station in 57 or 58.

In August of 62, William Emmerson voluntered for S. S. Service Company G which was the Union Army. In 1863 he was in Memphis, Tenn., recovering from the measels and was to rejoin his unit the next day. During the night he got up to get another soldier a drink of water. He died the next day, 7 March 1863. His body was sent home and buried on the old home place. Fifty years ago this cemetery was known as the Stokes Station Graveyard. There is no longer any trace of Stokes Station, and the cemetery is now known as the Rice Cemetery.

My grandfather passed away in 1942 and is buried in the Rice Cemetery. My father passed away 23 April 1964 and my mother 11 July 1966. Both are buried at Mcleansboro.

WHO WERE THEY?

If anyone can throw any light on the identity of the following Rices, will he or she please let the Association Historian know?

In the ill-fated silver service of the First Church of Boston was a silver tankard, engraved with the initials of previous owners "W" and "B & S" (the initial "W" appeared directly over the initials "B & S"). The initials were for Benedict Webber and his wife Sarch Rice Webber, and inscribed: "The gift of Sam'l More to ye First Church in Boston, 1717". Samuel More, donor of the vessel, a mariner; married Sarah Rice on September 10, 1702. She was the widow of Benedict Webber whose initials are on the tankard. Who were her parents?

Notes in an ancient Bible, printed in London in 1603 by Robert Barber, "Printer to the King's most excellent Majesty", read: "Joel Rice, of Marlborough, his book, 1733," and elsewhere, "Elizabeth Rice, deceased, October 13, 1733, in the 49th year of her age." In Ward's book on the Rice Family, Joseph Rice #70.5, is said to have married as his second wife, Elizabeth Robinson, on December 4, 1728. She died October 13, 1733, aged 48. Joseph Rice's children by his first wife were: Jesse, Eleazar, Mercy, Elizabeth, Mary and Ruth. No children are listed by his second wife. Who was Joel?

Early historical records of Amesbury, Massachusetts, speak repeatedly of Rice Edwards, mariner and ship builder, and an early student in Hampton Academy at Hampton, New Hampshire, was Rice Whitney. Does any one know who they were and where they got their first names? We believe that their mothers may very likely have been Rice girls, but who?

Robert Rice was in Boston in 1637 and was one of those banned from carrying arms, because of his unorthodox religious views. Some records (unofficial) claim that Deacon Edmund Rice had a twin brother named Robert who is said to have come to America before Edmund. Could this be that man?

Who was Peter Rice of Keene, New Hampshire, in 1761? He signed the Alarm List, served in the militia, and died in the Continental Army Service of the Revolutionary War. His wife at that time was Phebe - widow of Ellis. He was the ancestor of Miss Dorothy Vincent of Rochester, New York, a new Associate member.

INFORMATION

From "Genealogical Records of John French Johnson":

"Not to know what took place before one was born, says Cicero, is to remain forever a child, caring nothing for the destiny of the future.

The genealogy of a family is comparatively barren unless enriched by the intermingling of biographical sketches which may stand as landmarks in the history of a race. Mere names and dates do not in any sense make history or biography, and the living generations must do their duty by themselves that posterity may have those authentic records and memorials that no other source can supply."

Many people are confused and dates often misconstrued by "Old and New Style dating". According to Old Style, the year began on the 25th of March and 1751 was the last year of Old Style. Often, in recording dates of events which occurred from the first of January to the 25th of March before 1751, double dating (in both old and new Style) has been practiced. According to New Style dating, the year begins on January 1st, and the first practice of this was January 1, 1752. The day following the second day of September, 1752, was called the 14th of September, omitting 11 days in order to adjust the calendar.

- V Nathan Rice: m. Mariel Leavitt, 12 Feb 1781; resided in Hingham; where she died 7 Jan 1790 aged 31 yrs-10 months; bpt 5 Mar 1758. She was the daughteroof Elisha Leavitt, Jr. (The Hingham Tory of Hingham)
- IV Caleb Rice, b 13 Dec 1712; d 1759. Harvard 1730. He m Priscilla Payson
- III Caleb Rice, b 19 May 1666; d 5 Jan 1738/9; He married Mary Ward, 21 May 1696.

- II Joseph Rice, bpt 13 Mar 1637/8; d 23 Dec 1711. He married Mercy King about 1638; d 4 Jan 1668-69.
- I Edmund Rice and Thomasine Frost.

NEWSPAPER CLIPPING: "Hannah became owner of the island and on her death in 1765, Elisha Leavitt, the famous Hingham Tory, bought it at auction. In turn he bequeathed George's Island to his grandson, Caleb Rice, in 1790. In 1825 Caleb Rice, who also owned Gallop's and Lovell's islands, sold Lovell's and George's islands for \$6,000 to the city of Boston, which transferred them at once to the federal government. It remained in federal custody until 1957.

Amos Rice, Post Office Lowville, retired gentleman, b Green County; 22 Aug 1800. Settled in this county 1 Apr 1857; Wife, Loretta S. Andrews of Green County, b 23 Feb 1804. They m June 1824. Six of their ten children living: 1. B. Blair Rice, 2. Sarah H., 3. Yale, 4. William W., 5. Lucy Buell, 6. Rev. Francis Fenelon Rice.

Rice, who was born in 1865 and was living here in 1890."
