A TEACHER'S MEMORIES AND THE WOODCOCK GARRISON COMPOUND SCHOOLHOUSE

(Along with her dues and regrets at not being able to attend our reunion this year, ELLA A. KNAPTIN sent this little story to our Secretary, Margaret. It was so charming I just had to pass it on)

"I would like to see the Garrison Compound and the School House. How well do I remember my first day of teaching (1915) in a one room school house. All the grades, one through six, where in the same room. At 1 P.M., when I rang the cowbell at the door for the pupils to come in only the girls appeared. I put them to work then went outside to look for the boys and found them all lined-up against the back of the school, all smoking cigarettes. I simply said, "Put them out boys, and step on them good, as we don't want to start a fire." Then we all went inside. I never scolded or said a word. At closing time I said I would like to see the sixth grade boys for just one minute. I asked them if they instigated the smoking affair, which they said they did. I asked if they would do it again and they said, "No.". So, I said, "Good, go on home." No more trouble. I knew they were only trying me out for they had run out three teachers the year before. Would we could squelch our school problems so easily today."

WELCOME ONE AND ALL!

FROM NOTABLE AMERICANS RICE, WILLIAM WHITNEY: representative, B: at Deerfield, MA 7 March, 1826, son of Benjamin and Lucy Whitney Rice; grandson of Caleb and Sally Abbott Rice and of Phineas and Bethiah Barrett Whitney. A descendant of Edmund Rice, who settled in Sudbury, MA 1638, and of John Whitney, who came to American from England in 1635. He was educated at Gorham Academy, Maine and graduated from Bowdoin College in 1846. Preceptor at Leicester Academy, MA 1847-1851; studied law in Worcester, MA and admitted to the bar in 1854. Elected a Republican representative from Massachusetss, serving from 1877 to 1887. Honorary degree of LLD from Bowdoin, 1886. Married, 21 November, 1855 to Cornelia A. Moen, daughter of Augustus R. and Sophia A. Moen. She died in Worcester, 1862. He married again on 2nd of September, 1875 to Alice Miller, daughter of Henry W. and Nancy Merrick Miller of Worcester. She died in Washington, D.C. in March, 1900 at the home of her sister, Mrs. George M. Hoar. William Whitney Rice died in Worcester, first of March, 1896. (#VIII 4655, Rice Register, P. 764)

RICE, WALLACE (DeGrott, Cecil); Author, editor and critic. Born, Hamilton, Canada, 10 November, 1859, a son of John Asaph and Margaret Van Sycke (Culver) Rice; grandson of Anson and Lucy (Sherman Rice) and of Lewis Halsey and Ann Eliza (Sebring) Culver. A descendant of Deacon Edmund Rice. Harvard, class of 1883. Admitted to the Chicago bar in 1884. Married, 1889, to Minna Hale Angier of Chicago.

FROM THE SEPTEMBER 17, 1975 CEDAR RAPIDS GAZETTE . Dont be confused by the football game between Rice university and Utah next Saturday night at Houston, Texas.

Each School has a stadium named Rice. The one in Houston is named that for obvious reasons; the one in Salt Lake City has been renamed Rice because a Utah booster named Robert Rice contributed \$1 million to renovate the stadium.

Rice's new head coach is Homer Rice, apparently no relation

to William Marsh Rice, who willed \$10 million to the school that bears his name.




