## Letters and Queries:

Recently your scribe enjoyed a fascinating correspondence with Dr. Laurence Patterson who is now living in St.Eugene, Ontario. He adds a bit of life to the story of "Our Canadian Cousins" by telling us;

"On the Charming Molly May 17, 1760, were Stephen, Benjamin and Beriah Rice. The latter brought 2 oxen and 2 cows with him. On the same boat were Abner and Samuel Morse and also 'Michael Spurr and wife, 3 sons and 3 daughters." Dr. Patterson is descended from the Morse family as well as the Rice, and is related to the Spurrs.

These three families intermarried frequently; so there are Morse and/or Spurr genes in most of our Canadian cousins.

One topic of our correspondence was the identity of the men on the Charming Molly. There are several different versions in the Register, and your scribe feels that Benjamin, born in 1749, was too young to be counted, if indeed he did accompany his Uncle Beriah. Other names mentioned are John, and Ebeneezer, Jr. All of this will be discussed in the "Nova Scotia Rices", the compiling of which is almost complete. Nearly all that remains is to format it into a booklet and decide how to distribute it.

you to report the number of "lines" you can trace back to Edmund.

More people have entered the game.

- Virginia (Mulholland) Lewis claims descent from Edward and Samuel, viz. Edward. Daniel . . Daniel, Jr . . . David; Samuel. Hannah, m. John Hubbard . . . Hannah Hubbard I m. Paul Moore . . . Love Moore m. David Rice.
   Virginia's score is 222
- 2. Patricia Mitchell of Columbus, Ohio, traces her roots four ways, to three of Edmund's children:

  Twice through different children of Henry Rice and Elizabeth Moore (David, and Elizabeth, who married John Brewer), once through Matthew Rice's daughter Martha, who married John Bent, and once through Samuel Rice's daughter, Esther, who married Daniel Hubbard.

  Patricia's score is 43.
- 3. Arthur McClelland Fitts, III, begins with the advantage of both parents being descended from Edmund Rice. He traces his mother's line four ways, to Henry, Samuel, and to Thomas' through two children, Frances Rice Allen and John Ric Arthur's father's line goes back to Henry in two ways, through daughters Tamsen and Rachel. Since Rachel married Thomas Drury, grandson of Lydia (Rice) Drury, that makes three lines. Arthur's score is 7/4.

One of the interesting results of this little game is to notice the number of marriages between fairly close cousins, and the interweaving of other families with the Rice line. Most of this, of course, is due to the

smallness of the towns and the lack of easy transportation. We must also remember that cousins with different last names, such as Love Moore and David Rice, may not have realized that they were related to each other. Nevertheless, much of this knowledge could be missed if we did not try to learn as much about spouses as possible. In this issue most of the queries are about non-Rice spouses. We and the questioners hope that others share this kind of interest.


# Some Comments on Genealogy:

I.D.# (the long number which identifies each person in the Register and Supplements - Give the number (and the name) of the most recent person in your line who is in the books.)

For each generation not in the books: Generation #: died Descendant's Name: born (dates places) married in/on: date and/or place, died (dates & places) Descendant's Parents: (Father's name; dates born/died) (Mother's maiden name; born/died) date married: (Father's name; dates born/died) Spouse's Parents: (Mother's maiden name; born/died) date married: Children's Surname: First names in order of birth, with dates of birth, marriage, (to whom?) and death.

Comme.ts: Anything of interest, from 'captured by Indians' to 'served in Viet Nam' or any special accomplishments.

### Cover Picture

Your scribe accidentally came across this old post-card while composing this Newsletter. There is no indication of the age of the picture, but it certainly pre-dates the 1961 date when my father received it from Fred R. Rice. Today the hills are covered with suburban homes - nice homes, with large lots, but suburbia none-the-less. The pond itself has become overgrown with swamp plants. This, of course, is the natural evolution of a pond, and the increase in human habitation seems to be a part of nature, too.

Today there is a bronze plaque on a boulder, marking the spot where the pond and Edmund Rice's homestead once stood. A picture of this plaque, taken at the time of the 1988 Reunion, is shown below.

TO THE GENERAL COURT



Let us know the next time you come home, Jane!




