Registration begins at 9:00 A.M., with coffee and muffins made fresh on the premises. The traditional Directors' meeting usually held on Reunion morning has already been held, releasing a sizeable number of us to participate in the social hour and relieving a lot of confusion. During this time informal discussion groups will meet in several of the anterooms available, to discuss genealogy, history, the upcoming tour of Edmund Rice's England, or whatever. Our secretary, Gail Sirse, who has had experience in genealogical research in England, will be on hand with some English friends to join in these discussions. Bring your questions, and also your own expertise and experience to share with others.

Luncheon will be served at noon. We have three choices for the entree, fresh scrod, baked stuffed breast of chicken, and vegetables *prima vera* over pasta. On the next page is a Reservation Blank. HOW TO GET THERE -

Fitzwilliam is a "typical New England town" in southeastern New Hampshire. The following directions go with the map on the reverse of this page:

From Keene, N.H. take Rte.12, south.

From places in Massachusetts, from Rte.2 (the Mohawk Trail), take Rte.140 which joins Rte.12 in Winchenden, Mass, or take Rte.119 from Concord.

Those coming from farther south or west may prefer to take I-90 to I-91, head north, and exit onto Rte.10 Northbound at Bernardston, the last exit in Massachusetts. (Rte.10 parallels the Interstate through most of Massachusetts; so wait for the Northbound Bernardston exit before exiting. Don't be confused by signs pointing to Bernardston, SOUTH; you don't actually want to go to Bernardston.)

Some of you may wish to arrive Friday evening. If so, reservations can be made by calling 603-585-9000. The room rates (for 2 people) range from \$55.00 for a room with two beds and a private bath, to \$40.00 for a room with a shared bath in the hall.

We hope that this will be a relaxed, enjoyable day for everyone; so plan to come and have a good time!

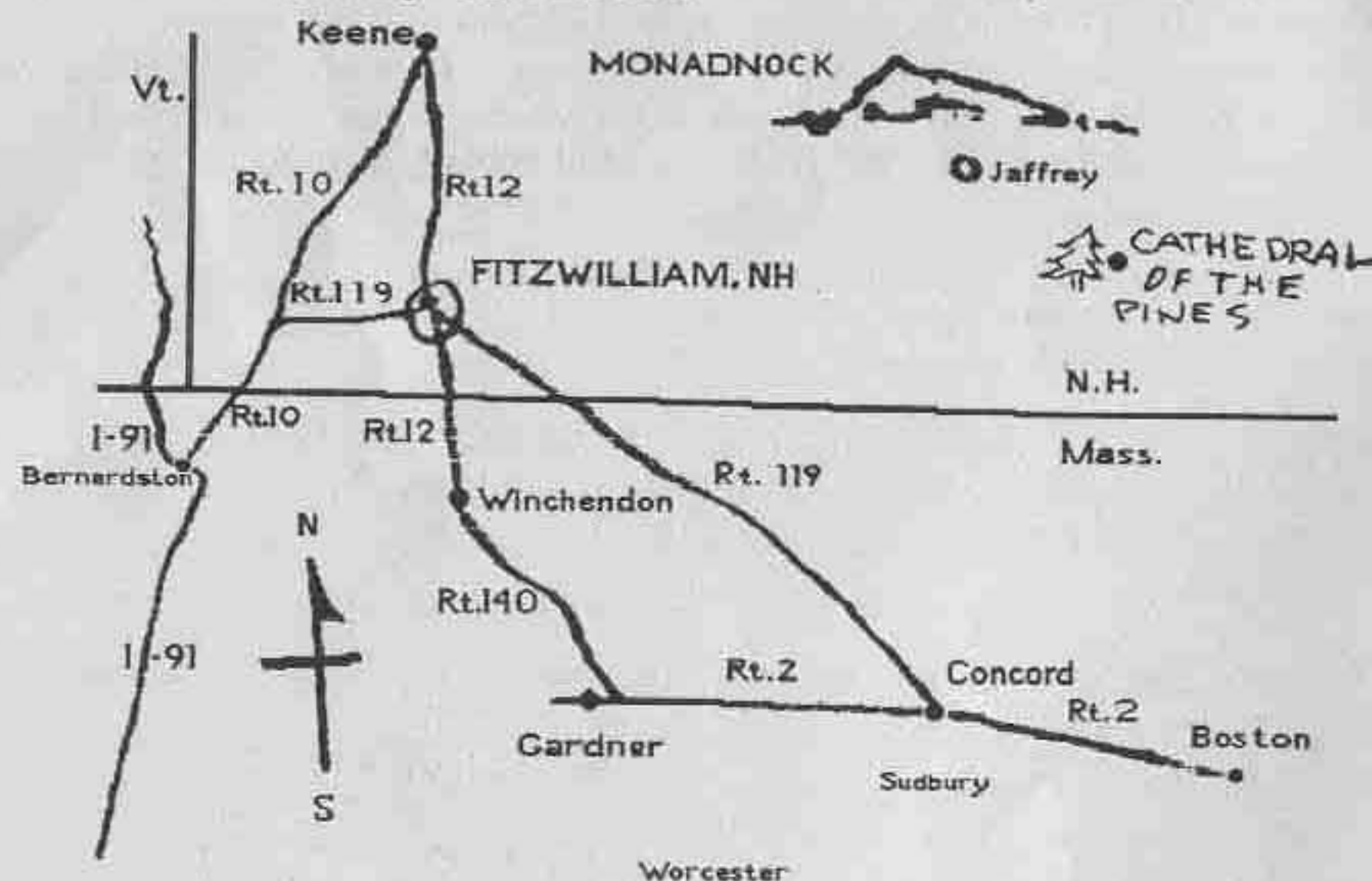

Beverly Farrington, 10090 Dawson Springs Road, Crofton, KY 42217

is interested in the relationships among the 1638 immigrants to Sudbury, Mass. Among these immigrants were John MOORE and his wife, Elizabeth, and their family. One of their daughters, Elizabeth MOORE, married Henry RICE, the son of Edmund and Thomasine.

Also among the immigrants were Philemon WHALE and his wife, also Elizabeth. This Elizabeth was *nee* FROST, and married a Henry RICE in 1605, and Philemon WHALE in 1621. She was an older sister of Thomasine (FROST) RICE.

Cousin Beverly has found an Elizabeth RICE, baptised in 1612 and married to John Moore "by 1639", presumably the immigrants mentioned above. John Moore's wife is elsewhere (including our *Register*) identified as Elizabeth WHALE, but if she is Elizabeth Frost's daughter, the correct maiden name would be RICE.

Was Elizabeth (Rice/"Whale") Moore, wife of John Moore, Elizabeth (Frost/Rice) Whale's daughter, and the mother of Elizabeth (Moore) Rice?

Can anyone supply further details to prove these Moore-Rice connections?

queried in the last issue about a ROXANA RICE, born 4 Oct 1830 and died 12 Feb 1924 in Clinton, Iowa, who married Reed Wilbur BOSLEY in Geauga County, Ohio on 21 June 1845. Roxana may be the daughter of SAMUEL RICE, whose name is listed in the Ohio censuses of 1820, 1830 and 1840.

Cousin Sandra has since learned that Roxana's father's full name is WILLIAM SAMUEL RICE, and that his wife's name is ROXANNAH BADGER, prob. born 20 Jan 1809 in Hillsboro, N.H. Her father was Samuel Badger.

Does this additional information help anyone to identify William Samuel Rice?

Jacqueline Hanna, 3765 Tartan Circle, Portage, MI 49002

wonders if the Daniel Rice (3-24-88-209-429) b.7 April 1753 and married Lucy Darling 24 March 1778, could be her ancestor. Daniel and Lucy had four/five children in Marlborough, among them a daughter, Polly, bapt. 27 Feb.1791. The family then moved to Whitestown, Oneida Co. N.Y., where one of Polly's sisters, Susanna, is known to have died in Dec. 1805. All of this info is in both Ward and the *Register*.

Cousin Jackie's great-great-grandparents were Amos and Polly (also known as Mary Ann) (Rice) Whipple. They were married - you guessed it! - in Whitestown, N.Y. on 1 Feb. 1815, and had six sons who later (about 1838) settled in Ingham Co., Mich.

Can anyone help Cousin Jackie confirm that Daniel and Lucy Rice's daughter Polly is the same person who married Amos Whipple in Whitestown, N.Y. in 1815?

Cousin Peter F. Wells, Box 152, Ringe, NH 03461

also has a problem with the identity of a girl named Polly - Polly LAMB. On page 230/231 of the *Register*, Abigail Rice, #1074, married Benjamin Lamb and had two sons and a daughter, Polly, born 17 Nov 1784. This information cites the Framingham, Mass. vital records, and adds that the family is "said to have moved to New York."

Cousin Peter's great-great-grandparents were James Jefferson Wells, b.1766 in Scituate, R.I. and d. 1843 in L'Original, Ontario, Canada; and his wife, Polly Lamb, b.13 April, 1784 in South Hadley, Mass. d.1850 in L'Original.

Same name, but born 7 months and less than 50 miles apart! Does anyone have information showing the identity or difference of these two Polly Lambs?

Cousin Peter also would like information about the ancestry of James Jefferson Wells, and about his mother's grandfather, Franklin B. Fifield (1848-1920), of Pittston, Me. and Ashland, NH.

is seeking a connection between her great-great-grandfather and Edmund Rice.

The 3-great grandfather was James B. Rice, who married Sara A. Plummer, possibly in South Carolina. Their son, William B. Rice, May 3, 1833 - Oct.31, 1909, was married on April 4, 1854 in Tuscaloosa, Ala., to Mary Ann McCullough. On Nov.5, 1868, he married, #2, Mary Marina Johnson.

William's son by Mary Ann, Edgar Rice, was born Oct. 7, 1864, died Jan 10, 1940, and married Margaret Jane Partrich.

Edgar's son, Joseph Edgar Rice, Aug. 22, 1891 - Nov. 9, 1957, married on July 30, 1913, to Mary Eva Cork. Joseph and Mary Eva were Lynda's grandparents.

Can anyone help with a connection to James?

is seeking the link between her great-great-grandfather and Edmund. Named Roswell Rice, he was born in Massachusetts on Oct.19, 1785. He married Nancy Keyes in New York on Jan. 2 1817, and they moved to Auburn, Ohio in 1819.

Their son, Nancy's great-great grandfather, was named Harvey Rice. He was born in Auburn, Ohio Oct. 26, 1826. He married, his second wife, Martha Hoxter on June 8, 1854, and died July 24, 1867 in Mantua, Ohio.

Nancy's great grandfather, also named Roswell Rice, was born Feb.3, 1862 at Parkman, Ohio. He married Mary Burrington Feb.13, 1883, and died in Welchfield, Ohio on March 11, 1945. Their daughter, Nina Rice, was Nancy's grandmother.

Can anyone identify these Roswell Rices?

A LITTLE EXTRA:

Two Cousins, in their search for more details about their ancestors, have come up with interesting side-lights worth sharing.

Cousin Joe Comstock has been looking for one Justin Rice for several years. While searching the records of St. Clair Co. Michigan, he found the following Probate Court abstract:

"RICE, Justin, physician, dec'd. Testate. [Died ca 28 Apr 1849, date of bill from cemetery] Will dated 25 Apr 1849. Names wife, Mary; daus: Elvira, Mary Anna, Harriet, Alice; sons: Charles and Francis. Exec wife Mary. Land on Harsen's Island, Clay Tp. Inventory includes a school house, a mill, piano, life insurance, 20 volumes of medical books." What a fascinating catalogue of possessions!

And Cousin Howland Taft writes;

"My great grandfather, Calvin Gould of Dedham, kept a diary for a few years which generally covers the weather and the church services. Not the sort of reading matter to keep one glued to the edge of his chair, but he did mention an item that pertains to a Rice family. On August 29 1878 he states 'Mr. William R. Rice's little son has strayed away,- he has been gone three days, & no track of him yet: - the mother is almost crazy.' Then on 2 September 1878 he notes 'Mr. Rice has found his boy, lost for a week,- he found him in So. Boston selling newspapers. He is only about 10 years old,- this is the third time he has run away.'

"Rather an enterprising youngster, but a sticky wicket for his parents. Those are the only clues I have. *Rice Family* has many Williams but none seemed to fit the bill. Some enterprising Rice might be able to track him down and learn what a handful his ancestor was."

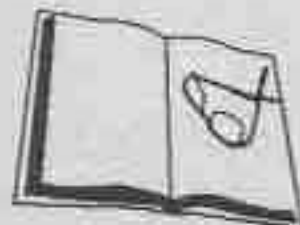

OBITUARIES:

Cynthia Greeley Rice, widow of Philip M. Rice and mother of member Arla Rice Staublin, passed away after a long illness on April 9, 1993 at her home in Waterman, Ill.

Cousin Cynthia was born in Duluth, Minn. October 25, 1906, the daughter of Harold and Cora (Crum) Greeley, and on December 16, 1924, she married Philip Rice in Lexington, Ill. Philip was a school teacher and a farmer. The couple lived first in Morgan County, Ill., but soon settled on a farm in Waterman, where they raised four children, three of whom survive; Arla, and two sons, Craig and Curt. There are nine grandchildren.

Cousin Cynthia was a member of the Waterman United Methodist Church, the Clinton Homemakers Extension Association, the DAR, the Society of Mayflower Descendants and the Grange. She had also been a 4-H club leader and a Cub Scout den mother.

POST SCRIPT

A few words about membership in the Rice Association - how people become members, what such membership means, and what is the purpose of this Association anyway?

The main purpose of the Association is to keep alive the memory of Edmund Rice and his family among his descendants, and to keep a record of all known descendants so that they may know who they are and how they fit into the larger picture. To this end records are kept, and communication among Edmund's living descendants is maintained and encouraged. The Newsletter and the Annual Reunion are means of encouraging communication and of fostering a sense of fellowship among the Association's members and friends.

There are no stringent rules or requirements to become a member of the Rice Association. Indeed, one need only claim to be a linear descendant of Edmund Rice and pay one's dues. Thus, anyone who has good reason to believe he is a Rice descendant and cares enough to search for his "missing links" is welcome as a member. The publications of the Association, and the family information possessed by other members, frequently provide the missing link, or at least a clue to where it may be found. Now, in addition to the Reunion, which is only a little over 2 weeks away, there are other opportunities for ongoing fellowship.



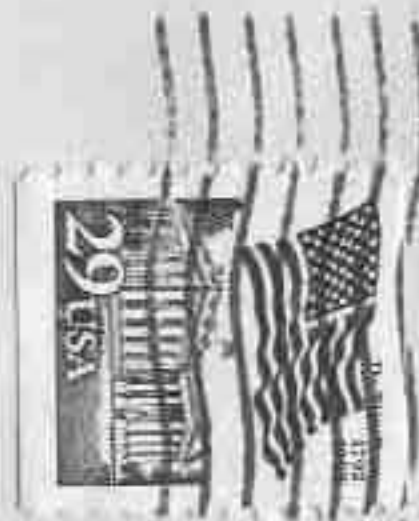
