## Queries from Members and Others Who Are Searching Their Roots

"Oral family history of Claudia McLemore Rice and William Brooks Rice (Captain) and documents in my possession show William Brooks Rice, b.2 Oct. 1856 at Edisto Island, SC, d.9 Dec. 1929 at Dublin, GA. He m. Maude Halcyon Bradly (b.17 Jan, 1870 in St. Louis, MO, d.9 Dec. 1929 in Dublin, GA.)

"William Brooks Rice is the son of Benjamin F. Rice (b.28 Sept. 1830, d.14 April 1884) who m. Rebecca Sauls of S.C.

"Bemjamin F. Rice's ancestry is traced therough David F. Rice, b.18 Aug. 1795, to David Rice, Jr. b.18 Feb. 1759, died in 1825. This David married Abigail Reed (Read) in 1785 in Mass. David Rice, Sr. b.16 Sept. 1717 in Mass. and died in 1801, m. Love More (sic) in Mass. There is also a Daniel Rice, Sr. b.18 Nov. 1655, d. 17 July 1717 at Marlborough Mass. and m. Bethiah Ward.

"There is some confusion in the family history as per Ward (pg.267) there is a David Rice who m. Nancy Davis whose son named Davod Rice resided in Princeton in 1854. Could this be the David F. Rice who is the grandfather of William Brooks Rice and the father of Benjamin F. Rice or have I somehow missed a generation.

"There are hundreds of Rices in S.C. and Ga. Who trace their ancestry thru Benjamin F & William B. Rice, but no direct documentation to Edmund Rice."

- "1. Seeking ancestry of Margaret Mary Little, born around 1820 in Northern Ireland. She was in Garden Hill, Ontario, Canada, by 1837, when she married Joseph Warren Haskell, son of Joseph Haskell of Lancaster, Mass. She had two brothers, Henshaw and Thomas.
- "2. Seeking the connection between the Haskells of Lancaster, Mass. And the Warren family. Joseph Haskell, born in 1776 in Lancaster, married Mary Warren (?) In1807. They named their son Joseph Warren Haskell after his mother's family. I have been unable to make the exact connection with her ancestry."



"Also need proof of mar. And death for Cazia Wilson, b. 1810 in Knox Co. OH; mar. a John Albert, and died in 1848 in Knox Co. OH. Also needed are parents' names. Since she died so young, was his second wife Katherine Cromwell?

Tour of England Planned by Members of Historic Tavern, now a Museum

Captain Isaac Jones of Weston, Massachusetts founded the Golden Ball Tavern in 1765. His grandparents were born in England, one grandfather is known to have been born in 1615 in Stepney, Middlesex. His great-grandfather Walter Haynes was born in 1583 in Semley, Wiltshire. Haynes was a linen weaver who went to America on the ship Confidence in 1638 and settled in Sudbury, Mass. Although they came from different parts of England, Haynes was a good friend of Edmund Rice in Sudbury.

Now the organization which maintains the Golden Ball Tavern as a museum, is sponsoring a tour of England from Thursday, May 9, 1996 through Friday, May 17. The tour begins with an overnight flight from Boston to Heathrow Airport, arriving the morning of May 10. From here you will drive to Salisbury, where you will visit Salisbury Cathedral and check in at the White Hart Hotel, your headquarters until May 14.

On May 11 you will visit Wilton, where the Wilton Carpet factory has been making carpet on the same site since 1655. On May 12 a pleasant drive through the Nader Valley brings you to Sutton Mandeville, where Walter Haynes married Elizabeth Gould in 1618 and raised six children. Here you may attend church and explore the countryside, visiting farms and hamlets that would have existed in the time of Walter Haynes.

Monday, May 13, will be spent in Bath, returning to Salisbury and the White Hart Hotel for dinner and overnight. Then it's on into the countryside again, the highlight being a visit to Winchester and the Winsheste Cathedral, then on to Surrey for dinner and ovrnight.

Then it's on to London on May 15 and 16, with tours of the East End, including the dock area, and the West End, including St. James and Mayfair, as well as the Globe Theatre, and ample opportunity for shopping.

On Friday, May 17, the tour leaves after breakfast for Heathrow Airport and the flight home to Boston.

Perhaps some of you who regretted missing Edmund Rice's "birthday bash" tour in 1994 would be interested in taking part in this one. For those of you who might be interested, and can decide something like this quickly, here is some "nuts and bolts" info:

The cost of this tour is \$1930 per person, double occupancy. This includes 7 nights at hotels, 6 dinners and 7 breakfasts, all entrance fees, land transportation, taxes and service charges, porterage of 1 suitcase, and a \$200 gift to the Golden Ball Tavern.

Excluded are AIRFARE, "subject to rates in effect at time of ticketing," tips to driver and guide, and other items of a personal nature. A deposit of \$500 is required to reserve a place on the tour, and final payment is due 60 days before departure.

Cancellation penalties range from \$100 to a 100% penalty within 14 days of departure. Insurance against these losses is available. You are strongly advised to obtain adequate insurance for all eventualities connected with your travel.




