President's Column

Dear Cousins,

Fred Rice said he was not old enough when he was asked some years ago to be president. I can't say the same but I can tell you I do not feel knowledgeable enough. However it is obvious to me that the team already in place is quite able. Bill Drury with his various functions of collecting dues and reservations and looking after our funds, Dennis Rice who has taken on the tremendous task of building the ERA data base and printing and mailing our newsletter, and Keith Capen Allen who edits the newsletter all deserve the greatest respect and gratitude. Presidents are expendable, but without these we couldn't function.

At the annual meeting when Fred Rice handed me the copy of Ward's, *The Rice Family*, which Elsie Hawes Smith had corrected, I felt a rush of awe for she was legendary in our society and as I mention in my thumbnail sketch, she was also from my hometown Barre. I will do my best to live up to her standards while I am your president. I thank Bill and Jane Drury for assuming the major role of hospitality during the annual meeting.

Al Clark's talk after dinner was fascinating with details of the large numbers (129) of Rice families in the Brookfields. Also, he brought original letters from Edgar Rice Burroughs concerning Burrough's family origins in Brookfield. I hope to be able to include some of these in future issues of the newsletter. Al also turned over to us a complete listing of all gravestones in Barre cemeteries that include many Rices.

Two things which I would like to see done in the coming year are (1) poll our members for their preferences, broadly stated, for where and when to hold our annual meeting and (2) make an attempt to find and document Edmund Rice's parents. Both items were discussed at the board of directors meeting on September 19.

The board of directors concluded that, in the meantime, for the coming 1998 year the annual meeting will be held the 18 and 19 of September within a ten mile radius of the Sudbury-Wayland area. The possibility of a group tour of the New England Historical Genealogical Society's newly renovated building at 101 Newbury Street, Boston is being investigated. Such a tour would be by chartered bus from our 1998 meeting site.

We also authorized the employment of a professional English genealogist to at least begin the search for the records of Edmund's parents. One reason for an English genealogist is his or her ability to read old English script. I have initiated a search for such a person and will keep you informed. Cousin Reginald Rice sent me an extensive folder containing details of his search from a few years ago. If any other cousin has suggestions for the search please let me know.

Membership

The Edmund Rice (1638) Association, Inc. is governed by a Board of Directors of at least five members who are elected at the annual reunion and meeting, usually held on a weekend in September.

Descendants of Edmund Rice were holding reunions as early as 1851, but it was not until 1912 that the Association was formed and officers elected.

Incorporation under Massachusetts law took place in 1934.

Membership is open to anyone who claims to be a lineal descendant of Edmund Rice. Rigorous proof is not required and many members have been able to ascertain their pedigree only after access to the books and files of other members. Spouses are also eligible for membership.

The Rice Reunion of 1997 was highlighted for me by the visit to Old Sturbridge Village and the tour of Rice places in Brookfield. I was lucky enough to accompany Hope Johnson Pobst and her husband John to see, among other buildings, the Bixby house that had been moved from Barre. Al Clark, from Barre, took us on the car caravan to nearby Brookfield after his lecture on the Rices of Brookfield.

I was born in Barre and grew up there on James St. with Hope, her sister Elaine and my two sisters, Dot Lou and Carol. Our fathers, Roscoe Johnson and Laurence Rice also grew up on that street. There were many other Rices in Barre but all the Rices were distant cousins for we had no first cousins.

When Fred Rice passed on to me Ward's *The Rice Family* edited by Elsie Smith, I was very pleased to become its careful custodian as her books on the Rices started my interest in Rice genealogy. My father, Laurence, gave me the first one upon graduating from college and the second when I got my Ph.D. Years before, I had dated Elsie's niece, one of three sisters. I dated the youngest and her sisters teased by calling me cousin. That was probably my first awareness of the extent of the Rice clan.

In later years while traveling I would check telephone directories to see how many Rices they contained. I still do. (In Japan, clerks at hotels and stores giggled when I told them my name.) Gradually, I became aware that there is more than one Rice family.

It is my experience that Rices are everywhere though not in large numbers. I encountered one student named Rice while teaching chemistry at the University of Wisconsin. At Carnegie Mellon University while I was Head of Biology, a Rice was also the Dean of Fine Arts and another was a Professor of Engineering. When I checked recently, there were none on the faculty. When I first arrived, there was a Robb V. Rice who got all my mail for a while.

I retired ten years ago as Professor Emeritus from the Biology and Chemistry departments of Carnegie Mellon University. While there, my professional life was spent in bio-medical research on viruses, collagen, muscle, and nerve at the molecular and cell level, much of it using electron microscopy. I also served as head of biology for seven years.

After retiring, we had a greenhouse built and connected to what was our summer cottage in order to do research with plants. There are now about 200 camellias planted outside to test their cold hardiness in the USDA zone 7 of Cape Cod. These plants give beautiful flowers fall, winter and spring depending on variety. This may not mean much to cousins in the south and California but zones 6 and 7 are at the edge of hardiness for camellias.

I live in the Sippewissett area of Falmouth which is between the village of Woods Hole and Falmouth center. I had been doing summer research at the Marine Biological Laboratory in Woods Hole since 1964.

My own genealogy research interest got off to a bad start when, on a trip to a Cambridge England lab in 1961, I stopped in Stanstead. I had no luck finding anything connected to the Rices, only to discover back home after reading Elsie's book that I had been in the wrong Stanstead! Last year, my niece, Susan Goldsmith Getz videotaped the way from Sudbury to Stanstead, Suffolk so that on a future trip I can find the correct Stanstead!

In 1990 I bought my first notebook computer and used a genealogy program from Parsons for a while. My sister, Carol Rice Goldsmith, revived my interest with her hand-written genealogy of our Rice branch.

Later, I attended the annual reunion held in Worcester and Dennis Rice was there with The Master Genealogist computer program and I was hooked. My lineage follows.

I have two sons, Lee Robert Rice and Paul Vernon Rice. Paul recently married Marybeth Freeman. In the above lineage, Nathaniel was an only child as were Ernest and Laurence. Carlo had a brother who never had children. Both my sisters Carol and Dorothy have children and grandchildren. So the pressure is on Paul!

Falmouth has a very active genealogy society with monthly meetings and weekly help sessions in the genealogy section of the Falmouth Public Library. It is there that I am gradually learning to search out my ancestors.

I have been concentrating on the women who married my Rice ancestors with considerable success, mostly due to an eight volume genealogy of Woodstock, Connecticut where my fraternal grandmother, Grace Walker, was born. These volumes, started by Clarence Bowen and completed by D. L. Jacobus and W. H. Wood, are in the New England Historical Genealogical Society in Boston. It must be the luck of the beginner, but I have traced Grace Walker's lineage back to the 1600's in England. My maternal grandmother's line has been traced back to Scotland. We have good bus service for the 75 mile trip and I am rediscovering the Boston "T" subway system.

All About Wendy Wesen

Wesen is currently the corresponding secretary of the Association. She is a lifetime member and has attended the annual meetings with her husband, Bob, for the last several years. As a teenager she came to meetings with her maternal grandmother, Nina Rice Estabrook.

Bob and Wendy have been married for 47 years and have five children (four of whom are married with families of their own) and 10 grandchildren. Wendy was born in Massachusetts and graduated from Framingham State College in Home Economics. Bob was born north of Seattle, Washington and graduated from Harvard. Wendy taught school and Bob was an electronics engineer for Westinghouse in Baltimore, Maryland where they still reside. Both are now retired and spend four months a year as snow birds in Venice, Florida with Wendy's 92-year-old mother; four months in Maryland and four months elsewhere.

They have been doing a great deal of genealogical research and have recently discovered that Wendy's mother is also a Rice descendant. Wendy is descended from six of Edmund's sons and from Edward three different ways. Wendy is a second cousin once removed from Margaret S. Rice, past president and compiler of one of the Association books. When Wendy was younger, she and her family visited with Margaret's parents in Englewood, Florida.

Bob and Wendy enjoy traveling and visited Scandinavia this summer and were especially interested to see the area in Sweden from where Bob's paternal grandparents immigrated to America in the latter part of the 19th century.

Queries Answered

<u>Dorris Smith</u>, 965 N. 827, Angola, IN 46703 went the extra mile by sending the following information on Sylvester Rice in response to an inquiry by Kathleen McManus, 19575 Waubascon Rd, Battle Creek, MI 49017; e-mail: mcmanus@fc1.glfn.org, in the October 1996 issue:

"I could not find a phone listed for Kathleen McManus; my letters did not return and I received no answer; my granddaughter is on the Internet and Kathleen's e-mail address was rejected, too. So, I am sending the information on Sylvester Rice to you for your records. Thank you, Dorris Smith"

The Sylvester and Harriett (Warner) Rice families moved from Walworth, New York to Homer, Michigan in 1844 where members of their families were already living. Syvester died on 14 Aug 1845, age 58, from pneumonia. In 1846 the Rice families moved to Branch Co., taking up land all along the Marshall Road in Coldwater Twp, way into Girard Twp. In 1978 only the Eber Rice place, near Coldwater was still occupied by a Rice descendant.

In 1906, Emogene, one of Sylvester's children, recounted some how her grandparents, Phineas and Merial (Dinsmore) Rice of Conway, Massachusetts were married in 1784. Their oldest living child, Sylvester, married Harriett Warner at 28. The couple lived first in Phelps, New York, then later in Parma before moving to Walworth. They had 11 children: Philetus, David, Lucinda, Luther, Eber, Samuel, Amanda, Russell, Emogene, Sylvester Jr., and Lucien. Sylvester served in the War of 1812.

This does not add a penny to my place in life, but since there is a chance that I am descended from some of the players, it does make it more interesting now to go back and study the history that I paid so little attention to the first time around.

Being part French-Canadian and part Irish and having traced most of these lines to the immigrant ancestor, I find many of my ancestors were at war with one another. How wonderful that so many ancient hatreds are now a thing of the past. Would that Northern Ireland could soon say the same.

I have information about the descendants of the Rice boys captured by the Kanawaka Mohawks from Marlboro in 1704, if anyone is interested. **

Murder Figure 7 Texas: Suicide

BAYTOWN, Nov. 17 (UP)—A sensational murder case of 54 years ago was recalled today in the gun death last night of an 80-year-old recluse.

Justice of the Peace Walter Queen returned a verdict of suicide in the shooting of Charles F. Jones, a recluse who confessed in 1900 that he chloroformed his employer, William Marsh Rice.

Rice, a millionaire philanthropist, lived in New York at the time, and Jones was his valet. Rice is the founder of the institute here which bears his name. After Rice was found dead in his New York home 54 years ago, Jones was arrested. He confessed he gave his employer chloroform but said the plot was instigated by Albert Patrick, Rice's attor-

ney, to gain control of the Rice

estate, records of the case show.
