President's Column

In England's various locations where our ancestors lived, about all that remains of their material lives are stone buildings, and in the case of yeomen, as were the Rices, that generally means only churches. These churches were and still are Church of England, whereas the Rices were Puritan and eschewed that denomination. It is these church records, however, that enable us even to know where they were born and baptized. We have no hope of locating Rice houses over there. In East Sudbury, now Wayland, we toured locations of early Rice houses four years ago, but very few such locations had houses still standing. We don't have an exact location in the Old North Cemetery of Wayland for Edmund Rice's grave. We do have several photos of Edmund Rice's homestead in Wayland that was burned in the late 1800s.

Some of the Rices moved to Marlborough in the 1660s, and many of their graves have been located there, for the gravestones are of slate. We have not been able to precisely locate Edmund Rice's Marlborough house but do often meet in and tour Peter Rice's house. Marlborough was split into several other towns and one of them, Westborough, has a number of Rice houses. None of these are of the first or second generation but several were built in the 1700s. The Westborough Historical Commission has compiled a list of historic house locations. Various Rice names are associated with these houses.

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For ten years the ERA has worked building an accurate computer database in which Rice names, births, marriages, and deaths have been recorded after verification with primary records. George King, Rice Historian, John Chandler, George Rice, and I plan to use the town's records and the ERA database to identify, as closely as possible, the past occupants of extant Rice houses. This compilation will be available for the **Friday, September 16, 2005 Tour of Westborough Rice Houses** arranged by George Rice.

The tour will start at 1 PM at the Wyndham Hotel where we will board an air-conditioned bus after a brief introduction. Hopefully, someone will narrate during the tour, which will stop at some of the Rice houses for photography. We may be able to tour one or more house interiors depending on George's negotiations with present owners. A visit to the Mohawk capture site is also planned. If time permits, we may be able to visit the Peter Rice House in Marlborough a few miles away. If not, Friday we can visit Peter's house late Saturday on our own.

<u>Details are in the reservation sheet at the end of this newsletter</u>. Sign up for the Friday tour and the main Rice Reunion on Saturday, September 17. At about 1 PM Saturday, our speaker this year will be **Rev. Mark Harris** who will talk on the **Transitions from Puritan to Congregationalism and Unitarianism from about 1740 to 1840.**

Database Update

Volunteers Needed.

Your association has several excellent paper genealogies from members who do not use a personal computer. Because the computer database is now our primary way of tracking Edmund Rice descendants, we need to add these records to our computer database. If you are willing to enter one or two of these genealogies into the computer database of any good genealogy computer program, please contact George King or John Chandler or talk with them at the annual reunion. We will help you get started and give encouragement and support.

Test Drive Our Computer Database.

Come to the annual reunion where you can test-drive our computer database. No more huge messy wall charts! The first nine generations of Edmund Rice's descendants will be available on laptop computers for you to check against your family information. Sources for all events will be shown and cited. A CD of this database will be available for purchase. Although the reports can be read on any computer, the database is TMGv6 format only.

Nine-Generation Rice Database Available on CD.

Your Board of Directors (BoD) agreed that we would offer the nine-generation report and database to our members. The BoD approved a charge of \$10 postpaid for a CD-ROM containing both documents. Please order from Bill Drury, our book custodian. The BoD placed three caveats on the distribution of these documents:

- 1) The information is copyrighted by the Edmund Rice (1638) Association and is restricted to the personal use of association members.
- 2) The CDs will be available only to association members who agree to its terms of use.
- 3) The association master database is an ongoing effort. We expect to add an additional 25,000 names and 20,000 updates during the next three years for generations six and more recent generations. This CD-ROM represents our database effort as of September 2004.

Author Peggy Jo Brown has written about **Francis A. Rice, Company A 15th Massachusetts Volunteer Infantry**, born in Stow on January 19, 1840 to parents James (James⁶, Reuben⁵, Nathaniel⁴, Nathaniel³, Thomas², Edmund¹) and Mary (Maynard) Rice of Sudbury, with service in the 15th Massachusetts Infantry. She shares this excerpted story from her book entitled **Hometown Soldiers: Civil War Veterans of Assabet Village and Maynard, Massachusetts**.

And...

Elizabeth "Liz" Rice-Smith explores the texture of the lives of our Rice "captives" (descendants and forebears). Using a wide range of primary sources, she explores, disentangles, and then weaves together the stories of their lives in the context of their times. Liz shares her fascinating research results in highly readable essays, which we'll serialize in our newsletters. Her first in the series is entitled **Reverend Parkman and the Rices: The Role of the Rices in Calling Parkman to the Westborough Church**. "Ebenezer Parkman was the first Harvard-trained, Puritan minister to be settled in the small frontier town of Westborough. He was called there in June, 1724... Notably, and fortunate for Rice descendants, Parkman kept a journal, and beginning August 14, 1719, detailed many aspects of frontier life... replete with pastoral references to many of our family members who were his parishioners." Liz uses excerpts from Parkman's diary to illustrate our Rice ancestors' lives and the events that marked them.

The Rice Family, by Andrew Henshaw Ward

Supplement Number 2 (Part 1) to *The Rice Family*, compiled by Margaret S. Rice (1983). Hard-cover reprint. New, unused. Additional lines of descent through the first eight generations, which were unknown at the time of publication of *The Rice Family* and the 1967 supplement. 224 pages.

The Rice Family, Supplement 2 (Part 2)

Supplement Number 2 (Part 1) to *The Rice Family*, compiled by Margaret S. Rice (1985). Hard-cover reprint. New, unused. A continuation of *The Rice Family Supplement 2 (Part 1)* from the ninth generation to the present (1985). 720 pages.

Edmund Rice and His Family and We Sought the Wilderness

Two manuscripts in one binding. Hard-cover reprint. 1986. New, unused. 357 pages.

Edmund Rice and His Family, by Elsie Hawes Smith (1938) An historical narrative about the early days of the Rices. Contains much genealogical information, as well as being a charming story.

We Sought the Wilderness, by Rev. Claton Rice (1949) An historical narrative based on those Rices who pushed Westward to the prairies after short stays in New Hampshire and Vermont.

Storage for Our Books

The books that the Association has for sale are currently stored in a rental storage unit in Tyngsboro, MA. The cost of this storage has escalated in recent years and we are looking for someone who has space available in a barn or outbuilding. More Rice Books

Peggy Jo Brown is the author of **Hometown Soldiers: Civil War Veterans of Assabet Village and Maynard, Massachusetts**, a collection of short biographies of 125 Civil War veterans who lived in Assabet Village (later called Maynard) either before, during, or after the war. The histories of each soldier and their families were researched over a period of four years. Data was collected from federal and state census records, cemetery files, headstones, newspaper death notices, state vital records, and pension files from the National Archives in Washington, D.C. 512 pp., softcover, indexed, illustrated, footnotes. \$19.95 plus shipping. Frederic A. Wallace is the author of "Ancestors and Descendants of the Rice Brothers of Springfield, Mass.: David Rice, William Marsh Rice, Caleb Hall Rice, Frederick Allyn Rice, Seven Generations – 1704 to 2004". This is a serious genealogy and history of the family descended from David Rice, who first appeared in the records of Milton and Weymouth, Mass., around 1725. Special attention is given to four brothers, born in Springfield, Mass., who went to Texas in the early to mid-1800's to seek their fortunes. One, William Marsh Rice, became the founder of Rice University in Houston. Their story is a classic example of a family torn apart by the Civil War. DNA evidence, obtained through the ERA's Rice Family DNA Project, is presented to resolve longstanding questions about the origins of this line. Peggy Rice Grosser is the author of "**Grains of Rice**—with an occasional dash of salt, a Rice family Chronicle from 1847-1947"—a compilation of family letters and photos and documents which would be of interest to Vermonters and history buffs of that time period, in general.
