President's Column

Greetings, cousins!

First of all, let me say that we had a fine reunion last month. In fact, it was the best-attended reunion in at least ten years. Note: in past years, we have often distributed a questionnaire at the end, asking about what the attendees liked or didn't like about the reunion, and how many previous reunions they had attended, and how they had heard about it. This time, we didn't get around to that step, but we had some input anyhow. For example, I asked for a show of hands on the bus tour and found that a significant number (I estimated between a third and a half) were first-timers. This figure is in line with questionnaire-supplied statistics from the past. Also, we made sure that the registration forms were distinguishable, according to source, and we found that about a third of the forms sent in had been distributed with the flyers we mailed out to all members last summer, and about two thirds had been downloaded and printed from the internet, while only two were clipped from the hard-copy newsletter (traditionally the only source).

Another thing we learned, from comments made during and after the bus tour, is that a guided walking tour along a busy street is impractical, since, inevitably, the guide's narrative will be drowned out by traffic noise. Of course, the location of the walking tour in Westborough was dictated by the concentration of historic houses along West Main Street, and the likelihood is that future walking tour sites may suffer from the same problem. I think the take-away lesson is that the participants need to have a written leaflet prepared in advance, so that they can make it a self-guided tour.

There is one thing that we couldn't learn by simply asking those who attended this reunion, and that is the question of who would be likely to attend a future reunion held at a locale away from the immediate vicinity of Sudbury/Wayland, MA. Two years ago, in 2014, we held the reunion in Sturbridge, thinking that the attraction of the history museum of Old Sturbridge Village would draw a record crowd, but the attendance there was below average. Was that because OSV is not particularly pertinent to descendants of Edmund Rice? Or had everybody who might be interested in visiting OSV already been there and so did not wish to go again? It's hard to say, but what about the future? If, for example, we decided to hold a reunion in a location far away from Massachusetts altogether, such as Salt Lake City, would members (and potential members) be drawn by the local attractions? Please let us know your thoughts on this subject.

Membership is open to anyone who claims to be a lineal descendant of Edmund Rice. Rigorous proof is not required and many members have been able to ascertain their pedigree only after access to the books and files of other members. Spouses are also eligible for membership.

Annual Meeting of the Edmund Rice (1638) Association September 24, 2016 Doubletree Hotel, Westborough, MA

About 60 members of the Association gathered at 9:00 AM at the Doubletree for informal discussions and refreshments, with opportunities to compare notes with each other and peruse the books we have in stock. At 9:30 President John Chandler began the formal part of the meeting by welcoming everyone there and presenting again, by popular demand, Michael Rice's 2012 introduction to the life of Edmund Rice. The next speaker, Michael Rice, gave a talk on the geopolitical context of the 1704 abduction of the Rice boys, that is, the global conflict known in America as Queen Ann's War. After that George King gave a presentation of the lineages of two modern-day descendants of Silas Rice (one of the 1704 captives) using the research performed by Beth McAleer and pointing out how others can do similar research on other lines. Then John Chandler gave a talk on the 1704 capture, including its motivations, execution, and outcomes. Finally, the attendees convened outside for a group photo.

After a buffet luncheon, the members were treated to a personalized presentation by Dr. Linda Welters of the University of Rhode Island on the use of fashion history to date photographs, working with a series of old family photographs furnished by Michael Rice. The subjects of the photographs had all been tentatively identified in advance, and the names and dates were supplied to Dr. Welters. Interestingly, her scrutiny revealed that, although most of the identifications were consistent with the clothing seen in the photographs, some of the identifications were apparently wrong.

After that presentation, there was a short break, and then the members convened again to conduct the Association's business. The meeting was called to order by President John Chandler at 2:09 PM.

It was moved and seconded to dispense with the reading of last year's minutes, so voted.

Jean Baptiste Thaiaiake⁶ Rice was also known as Big John Rice and Grand Baptiste.¹ He was a tribal chief, voyageur, famous river pilot, and farmer.¹ He was born on 5 Mar 1811 at Kahnawake, QC.^{15,14,1} He was baptized on 5 Mar 1811 at Saint Francois Xavier de Caughnawaga Sault Saint Louis, Caughnawaga, co La Prairie, QC.^{16,1} He married Agathe Kasennote Jacobs, daughter of Thomas Sawennowane (--?--) and Louise Tekhaherha (--?--), on 17 Jan 1831 at Saint Francois Xavier de Caughnawaga Sault Saint Louis, Caughnawaga, co La Prairie, QC.^{17,1} He married Marie Anne Manon McComber, daughter of Gervais McComber and Marie Angelique Giasson, on 23 Jan 1844 at Saint Francois Xavier de Caughnawaga Sault Saint Louis, Caughnawaga, co La Prairie, QC.^{18,1} He appeared on the census of 1861 at Caughnawaga, Sault Saint Louis, co La Prairie, QC.^{10,1} He and Marie Anne Manon McComber appeared on the census of 1871 at Sault Saint Louis, co La Prairie, QC.^{11,1} He and Marie Anne Manon McComber appeared on the census of 1891 at Sault Saint Louis, co La Prairie, QC; enumerated as Baptiste and Manon Thaiake.^{1,15} He died on 4 Sep 1892 at Kahnawake, QC.¹ He

was buried on 6 Sep 1892 at Saint Francois Xavier de Caughnawaga Sault Saint Louis, Caughnawaga, co La Prairie, QC.¹

Pierre Tekarenhonte⁷ Rice was also known as Tekarenhonte.¹ He was born on 24 Apr 1774 at Kahnawake, QC.¹ He was baptized on 26 Apr 1774 at Saint Francois Xavier de Caughnawaga Sault Saint Louis, Caughnawaga, co La Prairie, QC; baptized under father's name, Sakahohetsta.^{8,1} He married Marie Therese Konwanatontion (--?--) on 9 Jan 1797 at Saint Francois Xavier de Caughnawaga Sault Saint Louis, Caughnawaga, co La Prairie, QC.^{19,1} He died on 8 Mar 1828 at Kahnawake, QC.^{20,1} He was buried on 10 Mar 1828 at Saint Francois Xavier de Caughnawaga Sault Saint Louis, Caughnawaga, co La Prairie, QC.^{20,1}

--- 8th Generation ---

128. Thomas Aronhiowanen⁸ Rice was a tribal chief.¹ He was also known as Aronhiowanen "Great Sky" Atonwa; Spelling Variations: Haronhiowanen, Aronhio8Anen.¹ He was also known as Atonwa [Thomas].¹ He was born on 24 Apr 1737 at Kahnawake, QC.^{21,1} He was baptized on 26 Apr 1737 at Saint Francois Xavier de Caughnawaga Sault Saint Louis, Caughnawaga, co La Prairie, QC.^{21,1} He married Marguerite Teweson Tekahkwitha circa 1757.¹ He died in Mar 1779 at Kahnawake, QC.¹ He was buried on 10 Mar 1779 at Saint Francois Xavier de Caughnawaga Sault Saint Louis, Caughnawaga, co La Prairie, QC, Le 10 a ete enterre Thomas Haronhiohwannen, grand chef du village. Il avait environs 40 ans. P.S. sur le corps.^{1,22}

--- 9th Generation ---

256. Silas⁹ Rice was also known as Tookanowras.¹ He married Marie Tsiakohawi; (marriage record not found).¹ He was also known as Jacques Thanhohorens; He Splits The Door.¹ He was born on 10 Apr 1695 at Marlborough, MA.^{23,24} On 8 August 1704, while the Rices were spreading flax to dry near the house of Silas's uncle Thomas Rice, a small party of Caughnawaga Mohawks attacked the group, killing Silas's brother Nahor and capturing Silas and three other boys. The four captives were carried off to Canada, where Silas was adopted into the tribe and was given the name Tookanowras. He had a wife and children there.²⁵ He died in May 1779 at Kahnawake, QC.¹ He was buried on 16 May 1779 at Saint Francois Xavier de Caughnawaga Sault Saint Louis, Caughnawaga, co La Prairie, QC.¹

The Identity of Noah Rice Jr., Son of Noah Rice 1760-1834

By Michael A. Rice

Noah Rice (1760-1834), son of Phineas Rice and Hanna Cummins Rice was born in Sutton, Massachusetts and married Prudence Luce in Barre on 30 Aug 1781 (see Edmund Rice 1638 Association Newsletter Fall, 2007 Vol 81: no. 4 p. 19). On 11 September 1832, Noah Rice swore out an affidavit at the Chancery Court at Saratoga Springs, New York in support of his application to receive a pension for his service in the Revolutionary War as follows:

Application for Rev War pension, dated 18 May 1833. Was a fifer. 11 Sept 1832, court of Chancery, now sitting at Saratoga Springs, personally appeared Noah Rice, a resident of the town of Northumberland, in said county, aged 70 years. Born in town of Bany (sic Barre) in Co of Worcester in St of Mass on 5 Mar 1762. Enlisted in Hardwich (sic Hardwick), Mass, 10 July 1777 under Samuel Dexter of Hardwich (sic Hardwick) Discharged 4 Jan 1778. His mother was a widow. After Bany (sic Barre), Mass - moved to Somerset, VT, then Easton, Washington Co in NY, then to Saratoga Co NY. Sworn, 11 Sept 1832. Had a son Noah Jr. i

The fact that Noah had a son Noah Jr., is found in this affidavit to prevent confusion in any potential payment of Noah Sr's pension. But is there any other evidence of Noah Rice Jr. as son of Noah beyond this affidavit from New York? When and where would he have been born?

According to the vital records of Barre, MA, Noah Rice, Sr. married Prudence Luce in Barre on 30 August 1781. Noah Sr. and Prudence Luce resided in Barre in 1790 according to the census and they settled in New York prior to the 1800 census that showed Noah and his family residing in Easton, Washington County, New York. All children of Noah, either born New York or born in Massachusetts and moved to New York with their parents , were enumerated in a notebook that Laura Ann (Stickney) Andrews began to write in 1905 when she was 82 years of age. iii

Nathaniel Rice born in Hardwick, Mass, June 18 1783
Jemima Rice born in Hardwick, Mass, Feb 15 1785
Abagail Rice born in Hardwick Mass, Nov 9 1786
Arethusa Rice born in Hardwick Mass, Jan 31 1788

Rebecca Rice born in Easton N.Y. May 3 1793
Hanna Rice born in Easton N.Y. Oct 9 1796
Mayhew Rice born in Greenwich N.Y. Feb 12 1799
Laura Rice born in Greenwich N.Y. June 14 1801

Henry Rice born in Greenwich N.Y. Nov 3 1803

These children of Noah and Prudence Luce Rice and their birthdates in the Laura Andrews notebook appear to match well with other records (mostly census data after 1850 and dates on gravestones) that are confirmatory of the accuracy of the vital data. Laura Andrews stated that she met or knew of all these great aunts and uncles, but notably, there was no listing of Noah Jr. What might explain this discrepancy?

It might be possible that Noah Jr. was born in Massachusetts and never moved to New York with the rest of the family so that he was never known by Laura Andrews or was never met by her mother Hannah who was born in New York. The eldest of the children to move to New York with the family was Nathaniel Rice who was born 18 June 1783, which was 22 months after the marriage of Noah and Prudence. It is therefore possible that another child (Noah Jr.) could have been born in 1782 while the family was living in Hardwick, MA.

According to Ward (1858), iv there is a Noah Rice (#1758.6) born 21 January 1782 in Barre, MA. However, his father is listed as James Rice (1746-1832). James Rice married Susanna Cutting of Rutland (Barre) on 5 Sept 1770 and she died 5 May 1786 per her gravestone (Ward made a transcription error and reported it as 1780). James Rice had a second wife, Ruth White of Templeton, MA and they were married 12 July 1787, so it is the mother of Noah would be Susanna if James were indeed his father. An alternative hypothesis for the parents of Noah (1782) might be Noah (1760) and Prudence Luce Rice, also known to be residing in the Barre-Hardwick area in 1782.

Evidence supporting the hypothesis that Noah may not be the son of James may be found in Ward's account of James's will. Noah was not mentioned in the will of James Rice (written and witnessed on 15 July 1832 and proved on 16 Oct 1832). All the other children of James (including Lemuel, Sparhawk, Ralph, the heirs of Freeman Rice the son of James Jr., as well as Susanna, and Nathan) were mentioned and provided for in the will.

Noah Rice (1782) is known to have married Sally Shattuck in Barre on 3 October 1805.ii And according to Ward the couple moved to Union, Maine where they established their family and Noah was elected as a Town Selectman in 1808. One piece of evidence against the hypothesis that Noah (1760) being the father of Noah (1782) is that Ward lists the first two children of Noah Rice and Sally (Shattuck) Rice as Lemuel S. Rice (Ward person# 3223; b. abt 1807) and James Rice (Ward person # 3224 b. about 1808). These two individuals share the names of sons of James Rice (Ward persons #1754 and #1757).

Thus the identity of Noah Rice Jr. mentioned by Noah Rice (1760) in his 11 September 1832 affidavit executed in the Saratoga County Chancery Court remains unclear. Further evidence is required before any definitive conclusion can be drawn.
