

President's Column



Greetings, cousins!

Many thanks to Katrina Rice Schmidt for volunteering to resume the editorship of this newsletter, until a permanent replacement is found! The only hitch in this new mode of operation is that we will no longer be mailing out paper copies, except for the summer issue, which traditionally (and still) provides information about the annual reunion.

It has been a year since I wrote my last column, and a lot has happened in the meantime. For one thing, we held our second in-person Rice reunion since the outbreak of Covid-19. Attendance was below our typical pre-pandemic figures, but was a step up from the previous year.

A year ago I reported glowingly about the availability of the 1950 US census and predicted that the indexing at FamilySearch would soon be complete. My prediction has been fulfilled, though I must say that the index has glitches, such as failing to connect households that span two pages and the usual problems with enumerators' bad handwriting. In the long run, we can expect improvement in the interpretation of handwriting, since users can submit corrections to the name, race, sex, and age. In any case, I am too young to be listed in this census, but in ten years from now I expect to be able to find myself in an index to the 1960 census. Watch for it!

This brings us to the topic of privacy. Even without a presence in the released census, I am already listed by name, date of birth, and residence in the FamilySearch database called "United States Public Records, 1970-2009". Of course, people move around these days, and so the residence info from 14 or more years ago could easily be obsolete by now. When I google my name, I find, amazingly, that the first hit, out of 92 million, is actually me, even though my first name is very common among my generation and previous ones (whence the 92 million hits!) However, google offers a follow-up question: "People also ask is John Chandler married?" and the proffered answer is "On August 27, 1783, Chandler married Mary Whittier." from a Wikipedia article. Be that as it may, I suppose the order of the list of hits I see is affected by my search history, since my wife sees that item as #6 instead of #1. As it happens, the only other hit that refers to me in the whole first batch of results is a phonebook lookup with dozens of Chandlers in Massachusetts (for either my wife or me). For comparison, I note that the name "Zebulon Chandler" gets over a million hits on google, but seven of the first nine hits all refer to the same person.



2023 ANNUAL REUNION EDMUND RICE (1638) ASSOCIATION

WAYSIDE INN AND LUTHER RICE HOMESTEAD

September 22-23, 2023 (Friday and Saturday) In-person and Zoom Options

This year the Association divided the reunion between two venues. On Friday, September 22, 14 intrepid adventurers met at the Wayside Inn in Sudbury, MA, at 1 pm and boarded a motor coach to embark on a tour led by President John Chandler, ranging through the towns of Sudbury, Marlborough, Wayland, and Framingham. We visited the Goodnow Library in Sudbury and were treated to a display of materials from the Rice collection (some of which had been donated to the library by our Association). Among these materials were two copies of a book by Charles E. Rice which probably had something to do with the formal organizing of the ERA, in that it audaciously (but, alas, erroneously) attributed a royal lineage to Edmund Rice. We also visited two cemeteries (the Revolutionary Cemetery in Sudbury and the North Cemetery in Wayland) and noted along our route several others where many of Edmund Rice's descendants are buried. At the North Cemetery we particularly noted the monument to Edmund Rice erected there by the ERA, and we subsequently visited the roadside marker commemorating Edmund's second home site and also spent some time along the lane where that house actually stood. One curious feature that we crossed several times on the tour was the Weston Aquaduct, an underground pipeline (now no longer in use) for carrying water from the Sudbury River dam in Framingham to a reservoir in Weston. Another feature of the tour was the old Boston Post Road, which originally passed right in front of the Wayside Inn (that being the reason for its moniker).

We took note of several old milestones still marking the route.

Returning to the Wayside Inn at 5 o'clock, we had refreshments and then dinner at this historic site. After dinner, the Board of Directors met in the upstairs ballroom at the Inn.

Here follows is a summary of the Saturday session, serving as a draft of the minutes.

Starting at 8:30 am on Saturday, September 23, 2023, the members of the Association gathered for the annual meeting in the conference room of the Luther Rice Lodge on the Luther Rice Homestead site (also home of the Baptist Church of New England headquarters) in Northborough, MA.

The initial activity was a continental breakfast buffet, combined with some furniture rearrangement and unstructured socializing. According to plan, the visuals were provided by a large TV screen at the front of the room, driven by a laptop computer; a second laptop, with its camera focusing on the TV screen, was logged into a Zoom session available to members unable to attend in person. At 9:30, President John Chandler opened the formal session by welcoming the participants (eventually numbering 17 in the room and 2 more on Zoom).

After the opening remarks, John Chandler introduced the first speaker, Michael Rice, who delivered the latest version of a talk known as "Edmund Rice 101," giving an introduction to Edmund's world. That world is still shrouded in fog at his beginning, since, despite many decades of (sporadic) research, his parents and even his birthplace are unknown. The latest clue, as mentioned in the talk, is provided by genetic analysis of Edmund's male-line descendants, showing that Edmund most likely sprang from East Anglia, not Wales.

Next, John Chandler gave a talk about the ERA family database, not just covering the statistics, but also illustrating a case study of one particular recent addition to the database, showing how to get the most out of digitized original records.

After that talk, we gathered for group photos (including the Zoom participants on the TV screen), and then broke for a lunch buffet.

After lunch, we were treated to a keynote speech on the life and legacy of Luther Rice, given by Donna Carlin, caretaker of the Luther Rice Homestead site. Luther Rice (1783-1836) was a sixth generation descendant of Edmund and, like Edmund, traveled long distances. (He was a noted educator and missionary.)

After the keynote address, John Chandler called the ERA business meeting to order.

It was moved, seconded, and passed unanimously to dispense with the reading of the last meeting minutes.

Michael Rice then gave Treasurer's report (unaudited). In brief, the income for the fiscal year ending August 31 was \$6,348.01 (largely dues and notably larger than last year); the expenses were \$3,922.25 (largely reunion); the net increase was \$2,425.76. The net increase was partly because we printed only two newsletters and collected more dues than usual.

Kathleen Bond next gave the Membership report. We have 147 annual members, including 29 paid up and 118 not paid up. We have 156 life members, including 1 new this year. The total number of active members is thus 352, counting those in arrears but apparently still active.

John Chandler then called for a moment of silence in memory of the five members whose deaths had been reported to us in the past year: Jill Cochrane, Dolores Mandeville, Marilyn Nee, Peter Newbould, and Alice Wareham.

Michael Rice then gave the Book Custodian's report. We again had low sales volume because of the light attendance at last year's reunion. The sales included 10 copies of the 2022 USB database, 6 Ward Rice Family and Supplement, 5 Rice Supplement #1, 4 Rice Supplement #2, and 3 We sought the Wilderness.

John Chandler then presented the three traditional door prizes for this reunion: first a tie for the furthest traveler to the reunion, Carol Rice and Guy Gettle from California; second the oldest person present, Lillian Rice, 86; and third the youngest person present, Brian Rice, 50.

John Chandler then reported the action of the Nominating Committee in the preceding 24 hours. They nominated the following slate of officers and directors:

President - John Chandler Vice President - Brian Rice Vice President for Arrangements - Carleton Procter Treasurer - Michael Rice Recording Secretary - Kathleen Bond Historian - John Chandler Directors - Guy Gettle, Dale Gunn, Kevin Mullen, Doyle Rice, Tim Sanford, and Katrina Rice Schmidt

Special thanks go to Dale Gunn, now stepping down after serving for several years as Vice President for Arrangements and to Carleton Proctor, stepping up to succeed Dale.

No other nominations being made from the floor, it was then moved, seconded, and passed unanimously to elect the slate as presented.

John Chandler then reported on the state of the ERA family database. As of last month, there were 315,522 persons in the database, an increase over last year of 8,408. The increase included contributions from 4 cousins, and 5 others are still pending. Meanwhile, the on-line 6-generation edition of the database contains 16,588 persons, while the 9-generation edition has 138,777.

He then reported on the ERA DNA projects. The Y-DNA project has 426 members organized into 34 separate Rice families (include 102 in Group 1, the lineage of Edmund Rice) and 143 other members not grouped. The Sudbury mt-DNA project has 12 members organized into 2 female lineages and 11 others not grouped.

He then reported on a governance issue that came to light in the spring meeting of the Board of Directors. As a corporation under the laws of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, the ERA is required to define a procedure whereby the corporation can be dissolved if and when the occasion arises. However, the bylaws adopted in 1996 have no such provision. The Board therefore proposed an amendment to the bylaws to meet that requirement, as follows.


ARTICLE 14- DISSOLUTION

The Edmund Rice (1638) Association can be dissolved, at need, by the following procedure. The Board of Directors shall pass by two-thirds vote a resolution to dissolve the Association and shall present that resolution to a duly constituted annual or special meeting of the Association as a whole, and the advance notice of that meeting shall have included the text of the resolution. A two-thirds vote of Association members at that meeting shall be needed to ratify the resolution and thereby dissolve the Association.

It was then moved and seconded to adopt this amendment, and a vote was taken (two-thirds vote required for passage). The vote count was 14 in favor, 1 opposed, and 1 abstention. The amendment is adopted.

No further business being brought forward, it was moved, seconded, and passed to adjourn at 3:06 pm.


From David Smith: Hello again! I used "ancestry" to determine his parents but I am not certain it is 100 percent correct.


From Frank Dalley via email (December 21, 2023): John Chandler: Since doing my own "family tree", if you will – my mother was a Rice, I have branched off to other family members as well as some friends. I use My Family Tree for MAC as my database.

One of those other friends is my ex landlord from when I first went to Peterborough, Ontario, Ca. That was 50yrs ago and we are still friends. This is by way of introduction to an interesting association.

Dorothy's first husband was killed in a motor vehicle accident when their girls were quite young. In later years she re-married. Her new husbands first wife who had also died prior to this marriage is "related" to a Samuel Knight Jr.: b5/3/1709, d1/9/1801, who married a Mary Rice:

b18/7/1809, d28/3/1739, m31/8/1730 in Sudbury Ma.





I have attached a couple of screen shots of the data from "Find A Grave" and "Ancestry" which, as I suspected, are all different than that in the Rice database. I think my ERA database is 2018.

How would I interpret this confusing data? I suspect that ERA will say their data is true and ligit, and I have no reason to doubt that and I am not questioning that, however, how do I rationalize the other data. In fairness, I have found much contradictory info on Find A Grave, mostly on dates. The strange part is, like Dorothy, all of these people are very distant and in her case by marriage. She is of Italian decent.

As I have said to many people: "if you back far enough we are all related!" – somehow.

Response from John Chandler (December 22, 2023): Frank, Thanks for bringing this to my attention. The death of Mary (Rice) Knight was entered in the ERA database from Ward's "Rice Family" book, giving the day as "28" in contrast to the Sudbury VRs giving "18". Some 20 years ago, when I checked the database stuff against the published VRs, I evidently failed to notice the discrepancy, and left Ward's version unchallenged. I have to wonder whether the gravestone in the Revolutionary War Cemetery gives the day as "28" or whether Ward simply miscopied the entry from the VRs. Observe that the photo in Findagrave shows that the stone has sunk so far into the ground that the date is no longer visible. As a general rule, I have absolutely no trust in information in Findagrave that is not backed up by a photo. The Findagrave submitter appears to report the entire inscription from the stone, but the photo does not show any evidence that anyone has in recent memory done any digging to uncover the now-hidden part. Unfortunately, the compilers of the published Sudbury VRs did not include cemetery data in the book.

In any case, Mary's birth and marriage and Samuel's death in the ERA database all agree with what your screenshots show, and so there is actually just the one difference, as I discussed above. If you are wondering why ourdatabase is silent on Samuel's later marriages, the explanation is simple -- he is not a descendant of Edmund Rice, and so our interest in him is his connection to Mary, not the other wives.

If you are wondering about the double conflicting marriage info from Ancestry, you must realize that it's not at all dependable. The 1756 marriage to "Anna Eames" was actually the marriage of a different Samuel Knight (second child of Samuel and Mary) to an Ann Clapp, while the 1761 marriage to Lois Goodenow was a double blunder which garbled both the year and place, and even the 1769 marriage "Fact" is wrong about the place (which should be Framingham).

As for Samuel's birth, that will take some checking. We know the approximate date from his reported age at death. ~John Chandler

From Frank Dalley (December 22, 2023): John: Thanks for the quick reply – pleasantly unexpected.

I am quite frankly not surprised by your replies and I am more curious than concerned as the parties are quite removed from both Dorothy and myself. I must say that this arrangement has the most discrepancies and I too take info from both Ancestry and Find A Grave with at least one grain of salt.

The picture of Mary's headstone was submitted in 2012 so who knows what state it is in now. The submitter may have gotten the inscription from some other source.
